reconciliation Centre in 20° of Aboriginal seen BEEC

Bunyaville Environmental Education Centre (BEEC) is dedicated to progressing reconciliation across and within its local communities and as such, a major focus for the Centre in 2018 has been to develop all of its teaching and non-teaching staff's understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' knowledge, histories and cultures. This has seen BEEC staff participate in a number of targeted professional learning opportunities which have enabled them to progress on their reconciliation journeys to become more culturally aware.

Following an audit by Bunyaville teaching staff, the programs Amazing Adaptations and Camp Out were targeted to privilege Indigenous perspectives through embedding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander knowledge, language and ways of being into the programs' teaching and learning. Analysis of student data and teacher feedback collected from participating schools revealed that the updated Amazing Adaptations program and the new 'Camping on Country' program both improved student understanding about the concept of Caring for Country and consideration of Indigenous points-of-view.



In 2019, BEEC will continue to collect visiting teacher feedback for the Amazing Adaptations and Camping on Country programs, to strengthen the programs' Indigenous integrity. Centre teachers will also be seeking professional development and support from the local Indigenous community to be able to embed the local Turrbal language into these programs.

The privileging of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives will be extended to visiting kindergarten and early learning centre educators in 2019 with targeted professional development earmarked for the BEEC Bush Kindy – It's DEADLY! program. All Centre programs will also begin with an Acknowledgement to Country. Additionally, following on from the success of the Amazing Adaptations and Camping on Country programs, the year 4 Science in the Wild program has been selected as the next Bunyaville program to have Indigenous peoples' viewpoints, histories and knowledge embedded.

Facilities

For 2018, several improvements were made around the Centre grounds and buildings. New 'rustic' post and rail perimeter fencing was built, Centre garden watering systems put in place and the Yarning Circle garden planted. A removable umbrella was installed to provide shade over the Yarning Circle during the warmer months. Extra storage room under the classroom was also provided by the fitting of a roller door and installation of lighting. Planning has begun for the design and construction of a single garage for a new learnscape area at the Centre's front entrance.

Analysis and Discussion of Data

- A survey of Centre teachers' indicates improved confidence in embedding and privileging the knowledge, skills and understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and cultures following PD and implementation
- Non-teaching staff received the Hidden Histories PD and survey data showed development in understanding Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives and unconscious bias
- Analysis of student work created during programs modified to embed Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives indicated students were gaining an insight into the worth and value of Indigenous knowledge that has been gathered over thousands of years
- Teacher observations during these programs noted that visiting Indigenous students felt safe and were able to acknowledge their Aboriginality and to share their knowledge and experiences
- Feedback survey of client schools and other headline indicator data were used to assess curriculum alignment, client satisfaction, evaluation of BEEC in-field resources and effectiveness of programs in students achieving learning intent
